Focusing His Fire on the Middle East

Kim Jong Un held their summit meeting in Singapore. Kim agreed to the goal of the denuclearization of the Korean peninsula. Trump suspended the 'provocative' war games the US stages in Korea, the largest in the world.

Trump tweeted "everybody can now feel much safer. There is no longer a Nuclear Threat from North Korea". But then he extended the 10-year-old "national emergency" with an order which says that North Korea "continues to pose an unusual and extraordinary threat to the national security, foreign policy, and economy of the United States".

On the one hand Trump was bowing to the reality of a peace process led by the two Koreas themselves and which is out of his hands. On the other he was putting the issue on the back burner while he has other fish to fry. On 9 May Trump announced that the United States was pulling out of the 2015 nuclear deal with Iran. He said this was because of "the regime's dangerous pursuit of

> He echoed George W Bush's 2002 'Axis of Evil' speech which paved the way for war on Iraq. He said "if It says eliminating nuclear weapwe do nothing, in just a short period of time, the world's leading state sponsor of terror will be on the cusp of acquiring the world's most dangerous weapons".

Iran's constantly repeated position is that it "has never pursued and will never pursue nuclear weap-

ers the possession of nuclear weapons a grave sin and believes the proliferation of such weapons is senseless, destructive and dangerous".

ons is an "urgent necessity and a universal demand". It has repeatedly backed the setting-up of a Middle East nuclear-weapons-free zone and has championed the treaty banning nuclear weapons which was agreed by the large majority of countries in 2017.

Iran signed a 'Safeguards Agreement' with the International Atomic Energy Agency in 1974. Under it IAEA inspectors have reported no diversion of Iran's nuclear facilities to producing nuclear weapons.

Iran calls the story of the "laptop of death", which is used to justify the charges against it, ludicrous.

But Israeli Prime Minister Binyamin Netanyahu has been warning of the 'Iranian nuclear threat' for more than for 26 years. In 1992 he told the Israeli parliament that Iran was "3 to 5 years away" from having nuclear weapons. In 1995 he put that claim in his book. In 1996 he told the US Congress that the "catastrophic consequences for all of mankind" of Iranian nuclear weapons were "getting extremely close."

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In the run-up to the Iraq war he switched to warning of 'the Iraqi nuclear threat'. He said there was "no question" that Iraq had a nuclear weapons programme. In 2002 he told the US Congress that this was highly advanced.

Iraq was invaded and set ablaze. No signs of nuclear weapons were found. Netanyahu returned to warning of the 'Iranian nuclear threat'.

In 2012 he went to the United Nations and drew a "clear red line" on a cartoon bomb which he said Iran must not be allowed to cross. In 2015 he told the United States Congress of the danger of "Iran's quest for nuclear weapons" saying that, like the Nazis, "Iran's regime poses a grave threat to the peace of the entire world".

For 50 years Israel has been the Middle East's only nuclear weapons state. And it claims the right to Following the US pull-out from the attack any other country in the region which it says is developing

them. In 1981 Israel bombed an Iraqi nuclear research reactor using that justification.

The UN Security Council, including the US and Britain, "strongly condemned" that attack "in clear violation of the Charter of the UN and the norms of international conduct" and called on Israel to open its nuclear facilities to international inspection. It hasn't.

The 2015 deal went ahead. Iran is one of 44 officially 'nuclearcapable' states. But it was singled out for "the most intrusive inspections regime ever agreed to" and the world's "most robust nuclear verification regime".

Iran plugged its heavy-water reactor with concrete and mothballed most of its centrifuges. Weapons inspectors declared it to be in full compliance with the agreement. Global sanctions were lifted.

deal the US Secretary of State said the Trump administration was pre-

paring to impose "the strongest sanctions in history" on Iran. It has already tightened some of them. In August it will curb Iran's purchase of dollars and sale of gold. From early November it will impose sanctions on anyone importing Iranian oil.

And if sanctions fail the 'military option' remains ever-ready. The combined military spending of the United States and its Middle East allies, especially Israel and Saudi Arabia, is 60 times that of Iran's. Militarisation is key to Trump's agenda. As he told US Navy cadets on 25 May "We have begun the great rebuilding of the United States military. No money for the military? Those days are over. We have just secured the largest-ever amount of money to support our great war fighters. We will have the strongest military that we have ever had".

In Memoriam: Isobel McHarg

sobel McHarg died peacefully at the University Hospital Lewisham on 6th June aged 67.

She was a dedicated campaigner, CND Council member and Treasurer of London region CND for many years until ill health caught up with her. She was also a long-time member of the Nuclear Trains Action Group and before that of the Nuclear-Free Thames Campaign.

Kate Hudson, General Secretary of British CND said "Isobel was a determined and extremely positive campaigner. I have very happy memories of working with her and Pat Allen in my early years in Hackney and Islington CND."

Ann Garratt, Bromley CND secretary, said "Her dedication, courage and determination in her campaigning is an example for us all. She will be sorely missed".

David Leal recalls Isobel walking very slowly and determinedly to a flooding River Quaggy in torrential rain to throw chrysanthemums into it on Nagasaki Day, putting folk song requests to Jim Radford on Hiroshima Day and joining in - knowing all the words.

Isobel was a Scottish National Party supporter and one-time Treasurer of its London branch. Fraser Serle remembers her as "completely committed to the causes she supported ... always talking about the various demonstrations, meetings etc that were happening". John Green recalls her as "a party stalwart through some very difficult times for the party". David Nummey remembers her very well and helped her move from north London into her last home in Grove Park.



Isobel was an ardent Arsenal FC fan and season ticket holder. On one occasion her interests clashed when she was stuck in traffic going to a London CND meeting because Arsenal were playing Galataseray at home!

Her funeral was on 27th June in Stranraer, Dumfries and Galloway. Ann Garrett represented CND. Isobel is survived by her mother Catherine.

Despite several bouts of ill health in recent years, she maintained her ironic good humour to the end, and will be missed by all.
